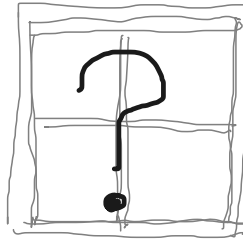

Why Window??

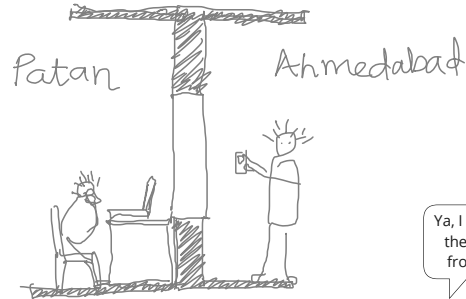
It changes the way one looks at the space.

Heyyy, Hiii !!!

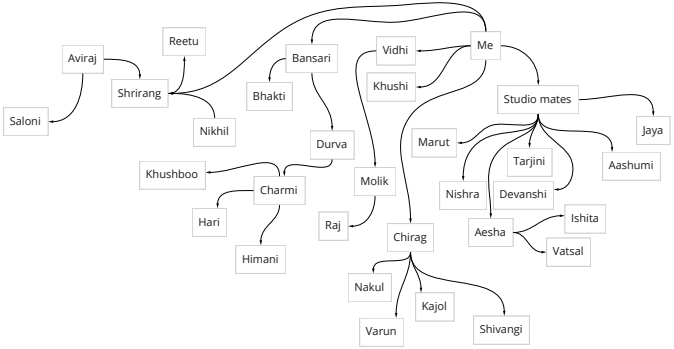

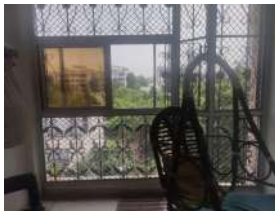

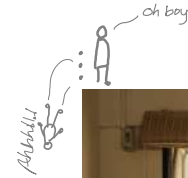

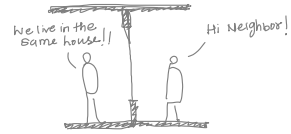

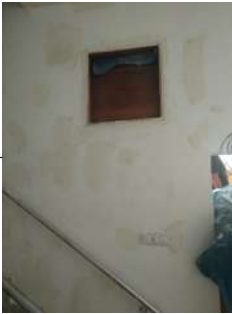

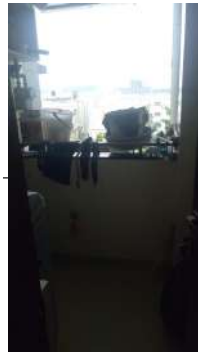

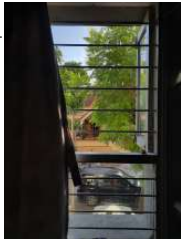

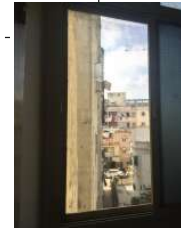
